Opening Remarks

Meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m., by Chairman Allen Poole. Chairman Poole welcomed the new members to the board.

Introduction of New Commission Members

Governor Kemp has appointed four additional board members. They are the following: Barry Schrenk (Owner, Taggart's Driving School) and Kathy Watts (Owner, New London Driving School) representing private driving schools and Laura Boalch (Chief of Staff, Technical College System of Georgia) and Jennifer Marletta (Driver's Education Specialist, Marietta City Schools) representing public driving schools to the board. The new members took a moment to introduce themselves in the meeting. Chairman Poole and the commission is looking forward to doing some great things with our new board members.

Approval of Agenda

Chairman Poole presented the agenda. Vice Chairman Spencer R. Moore made a motion to adopt the agenda. Mr. J. Barry Schrenk seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Approval of April 11, 2022 Meeting Minutes

Chairman Poole presented the March 23, 2021, meeting minutes. Vice Chairman Moore made a motion to adopt the minutes. Chairman Poole seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Approval of May 10, 2022 Called Meeting Minutes

Vice Chairman Moore made a motion to adopt the minutes. Ms. Laura Boalch seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Public Comment

Chairman Poole offered a time for Public Comment. There was no response.

Staff Report

Mr. Josh Turner presented the staff report including the Provider Scholarship Redemption Report, FY 2022 Customer Service Report, for April through June Scholarship Report. A copy of the Staff Report is attached. Mr. Turner took a moment to thank the staff for their hard work during the legislative session.

Chairman Poole asked if there were any questions for Mr. Turner regarding the Staff report. Chairman Poole entertain a motion to approve the report. Mr. Schrenk made a motion to adopt the minutes. Ms. Boalch seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Adoption Fiscal Year 2023 Proposed Meeting Schedule

Chairman Poole presented the proposed meeting schedule for Fiscal Year 2023 as follows:

Chairman Poole asked if there was a motion to approve the FY 2023 proposed meeting schedule. Mr. Schrenk made a motion to adopt the proposed meeting schedule as presented. Chairman Pool seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Adoption of Fiscal Year 2022 Budget Amendment

Mr. Turner presented the Fiscal Year 2022 Amended Budget and provided an overview of the proposed changes. Chairman Poole asked the board was there any questions regarding the amendment budget.

Chairman Poole advised that Mr. Turner is available to meet with anyone to review each line item if needed. Mr. Turner is available to provide a clear explanation for anyone who wants to become familiar with the budget.

Chairman Poole made a motion to adopt the Fiscal Year 2022 Amended budget. Vice Chairman Moore seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously. A copy of the Amended Fiscal Year 2022 Budget as adopted is attached to these minutes.

Adoption of Fiscal Year 2023 Budget

Chairman Poole presented the Fiscal Year 2023 Budget. Chairman Poole asked Mr. Turner to present the report. A copy of the report is attached.

Mr. Turner highlighted the software support line item which is for maintenance and upgrades. One of the proposed upgrades includes providing text messages and notifications to students and parents when their award is processed to increase time and efficiencies. In the past, the staff has received complaints that some parents and students do not receive email notifications regarding their award due to email spam blockers. This added method of communication will be another way of notifying the parents and students that their award was submitted successfully, including, notifications on redeeming the redemption codes and providing the completion date deadlines.

Also, the collections for the Driver Training and Education Fund for Fiscal Year 2022 as of June 7, 2022, was \$2,592,320.06. The Commission should be prepared for a potential decrease in the Amended Fiscal Year 2023 budget.

There was no further discussion about the budget.

Mr. Schrenk made a motion to adopt the budget. Ms. Boalch seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously. A copy of the Fiscal Year 2023 Budget as adopted is attached to these minutes.

<u>Final Consideration and Possible Adoption of the Amendment to the Criteria Governing the Georgia Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program</u>

Mr. Turner presented the revised amendment that provides a summary of proposed changes to the Georgia Driver's Education Commission's Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program Eligibility Requirements. These proposed amendments were recommended by members of the Senate Public Safety Committee and will become effective July 1, 2022.

Mr. Turner provided a copy of the 175% of Free and Reduced-Price Meal Eligibility documentation and provided a summary. Mr. Turner previously provided a transcript of the public hearing conducted by Chairman Poole to provide public participation in this process. The transcript will be included as a part of the record.

There were no members of the public at the hearing to comment and Mr. Turner confirmed that no written comments were received by email or by mail and that no one commented by phone. There was further discussion regarding the Amendment to the Criteria Governing the Georgia Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program.

Mr. Schrenk congratulated Chairman Poole and Mr. Turner on their outstanding presentation during two separate Senate Public Safety Committee meetings. Mr. Schrenk stated that the two answered all questions honestly and provided correct information. They did a great job for the Governor's Office of

Highway Safety and the Georgia Driver's Education Commission. Anyone who attended that meeting should have the same appreciation for all that they did to protect the program. Chairman Poole thanked Mr. Schrenk for those comments.

Chairman Poole took a moment to thank Ms. Amy Radley from the Georgia Attorney General's Office. Ms. Radley has been very instrumental in assisting the Georgia Driver's Education Commission during the development of the changes to the program criteria.

Chairman Poole called for a motion to approve the Adoption of the Amendment to the Criteria Governing the Georgia Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program effective July 1, 2022. Mr. Schrenk made a motion to approve. Chairman Poole seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Other Business

Chairman Poole opened the floor for other business. He also, welcomed the new board members again for coming onboard. There was no further discussion.

Adjournment

Mr. Schrenk made a motion to adjourn. Chairman Poole seconded the motion. The motion to adjourn passed unanimously.

Amendments to Georgia Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program as Adopted

Georgia Driver's Education Commission Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program Eligibility Requirements (Adopted 9/26/16 and Amended on 11/16/16ⁱ, 3/21/17ⁱⁱ, 6/26/17ⁱⁱⁱ, 9/26/17^{iv}, 3/27/18^v, 3/26/19^{vi}, and 6/28/19^{vii}, and 6/10/22^{viii})

A. Student Eligibility

- 1. The student must be a resident of the State of Georgia and actively enrolled in school.
- 2. The student must be between the ages of fifteen and seventeen and possess a valid Georgia instructional driving permit or driver's license.
- 3. First priority will be given to grant scholarship applicants who are a child or dependent of a public safety professional Georgia first responder disabled or killed in the line of duty or member of the United States military killed in the line of dutyaction and to applicants who are in state custody under the care of the Georgia Department of Family and Children Services. -If the applicant is a child or dependent of a public safety professional Georgia first responder disabled or killed in the line of duty, the applicant must identify said professional and provide a copy of the student applicant's birth certificate or other government issued documentation proving the student was a dependent of the identified public safety professional Georgia first responder. For purposes of this grant scholarship program, the Georgia Driver's Education Commission will rely on the Georgia Public Safety Memorial Committee to identify and define a Georgia first responder public safety professionals killed in the line of duty. For purposes of this grant scholarship program, the Georgia Driver's Education Commission will rely on O.C.G.A § 35-8-7.4 (a) to identify and define a Georgia first responder. If the applicant is a child or dependent of a Georgia first responder disabled in the line of duty, the applicant must provide of letter of disability. If the applicant is a child or dependent of United States military personnel killed in the line of dutyaction, the applicant must provide DD Form 1300 (Report of Casualty) as documentation. If the applicant is under the care of the Georgia Department of Family and Children Services, the applicant must submit a letter documenting custody from the Georgia Department of Family and Children Services. Grant scholarship allocations in this priority level will be evenly distributed among Georgia's United States congressional districts.
- 4. Second priority will be given to scholarship applicants who can demonstrate a need based on family income. Financial need eligibility will be based on 125175% of the Free and Reduced Price Meal Eligibility program for the State of Georgia as published by the Georgia Department of Education. The Commission authorizes agency staff to make necessary technical adjustments to the Georgia Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program application and award process to ensure that the eligibility level is appropriately adjusted as the financial need eligibility for the Free and Reduced Price Meal program is increased or decreased by the Georgia Department of Education. Commented [TJ1]: 35-8-7.4 (a): As used in this Code section, the term "first responder" means any firefighter of a municipal, county, or volunteer fire department, a peace officer as defined in Code Section 35-8-2, and an emergency medical technician as defined in Code Section 16-10-24.2.

35-8-2: "Peace officer" means, for purposes of this chapter only:

(A) An agent, operative, or officer of this state, a subdivision or municipality thereof, or a railroad who, as an employee for hire or as a volunteer, is vested either expressly by law or by virtue of public employment or service with authority to enforce the criminal or traffic laws through the power of arrest and whose duties include the preservation of public order, the protection of life and property, and the prevention, detection, or investigation of crime;

(B) An enforcement officer who is employed by the Department of Transportation in its Office of Permits and Enforcement and any person employed by the Department of Juvenile Justice who is designated by the commissioner to investigate and apprehend delinquent children and any child with a pending juvenile court case alleging the child to

be a child in need of services; (B.1) Personnel who are authorized to exercise the power of arrest, who are employed or appointed by the Department of Juvenile Justice, and whose full-time duties include the preservation of public order, the protection of life and property, the detection of crime, the supervision of delinquent children in the department's institutions, facilities, or programs, or the supervision of delinquent children under intensive supervision in the community; (C) Personnel who are authorized to exercise the power of arrest and who are employed or appointed by the Department of Corrections, the Department of Community Supervision, the State Board of Pardons and Paroles, municipal correctional institutions employing 300 or more correctional officers, county probation systems, and county correctional institutions; and

(D) An administrative investigator who is an agent, operative, investigator, or officer of this state whose duties include the prevention, detection, and investigation of violations of law and the enforcement of administrative, regulatory, licensing, or certification requirements of his or her respective employing agency.

Law enforcement support personnel are not peace officers within the meaning of this chapter, but they may be certified upon voluntarily complying with the certification provisions of this chapter.

16-10-24.2: "Emergency medical technician" means any person who has been certified as an emergency medical technician, cardiac technician, paramedic, or first responder pursuant to Chapter 11 of Title 31.

- allocations in this priority level will be evenly distributed among Georgia's United States congressional districts.
- Third priority will be given to all applicants who do not meet the criteria set forth in the
 first priority and second priority outlined above. Grant scholarship allocations in this
 priority level will be evenly distributed among Georgia's United States congressional
 districts. Paragraph reserved.
- 6. Grant scholarships will be awarded monthly. Grant scholarship applications are due on the last day of every month. Grant Scholarship awards and denials will be issued on the 1st day of each following month and will be sent by electronic mail. The number of grant scholarships available to be awarded will be determined by staff and entered into the grant scholarship management system. Grant scholarships will be awarded based on the priority levels defined above. All of the applicants in the first priority will be awarded before the second priority applicants. and all of the second priority applicants will be awarded before third priority applicants are awarded a grant scholarship. If more grant scholarship applications are submitted than grant scholarships available in each priority level, grant scholarships will be awarded using a computer generated random selection method from the priority level applications. The grant scholarship will be awarded in the form of a voucher to the student. The student may then take said voucher to an eligible provider Authorized Provider. The Authorized Pprovider will then submit the voucher to the Commission for reimbursement as set forth herein.
- 7. Students are only eligible to apply for a grant scholarship one time. <u>If a student's application is rejected</u>, the application will be reconsidered for the following two months and given priority over new applicants.
- 8. Scholarships are only valid for students who agree to complete a standard 30/6 driver's education course in which the student receives a minimum of thirty (30) hours of classroom training and six (6) hours of behind the wheel training. Additionally, the student's parent or guardian must be a co-applicant and agree to complete forty hours of supervised driving with the student. Additionally, the scholarship must be awarded prior to the start date of the driver's education course.
- 9. Students will only be awarded one scholarship. In the event of a failure or withdrawal from the course, the student will not be eligible to apply for another scholarship.
- 10. Grant Scholarship awardees must identify the provider of choice from a list of authorized providers and redeem the grant scholarship with the provider within 30 days of the grant scholarship award notice. Further, the driver's education course must be completed within 180 days of the grant scholarship award date. If a scholarship is not redeemed after 30 days of notice of the award and the course is not completed within 180 days of notice of the award of the grant scholarship by the student, the grant scholarship is forfeited and the student loses the scholarship and eligibility to apply again in the future. Students and providers may petition the Chairman of the Georgia Driver's Education Commission, or his designee, for a one-time 60 day extension of these deadlines. Additional requests will

be considered with a proven medical reason from a physician necessitating the addition time extension.

B. Provider Eligibility

- 1. Provider eligibility is open to the following types of providers:
 - Public and private high schools that are licensed by the Georgia Department of Driver Services.
 - b. Private driving schools (commercial for profit, and not for profit) that are licensed by the Georgia Department of Drivers Services and that have been licensed for a minimum of two years.
 - c. Technical Colleges, Colleges, Universities and State Agencies that are authorized to provide driver's education by their governing bodies and that meet the minimum standards for drivers training and driver's education set forth by said governing body.
- 2. In order to participate in the scholarship program, providers must submit a completed Provider Application and meet the minimum qualifications set forth in these requirements. All providers must agree to abide by the State of Georgia vendor requirements including, but not limited to, compliance with the Statewide Sexual Harassment Prevention Policy in accordance with Executive Order 01.14.19.02, the submission of a Form W-9, Vendor Management Form, E-Verify documents and agree to receive payments by Automated Clearing House (ACH) transfer.
- 3. Private driving schools must be in compliance with the Georgia Department of Revenue.
- 4. Government-owned driving schools must be in compliance with all Georgia Department of Audit and Accounts regulations.
- 5. Public and private high schools and private driving schools must be in good standing with the Georgia Department of Driver Services (DDS). Additionally, public and private high schools must submit a copy of the most recent audit report conducted by DDS and a corrective action plan if one was issued. If a public or private high school or private driving school has received a moderate or severe risk assessment within the previous year from DDS, the driver training school must provide the subsequent audit report demonstrating that the concerns raised in the DDS audit report have been satisfactorily addressed before they will become an authorized provider in the program.
- 6. Technical Colleges, Colleges and Universities, and State Agencies who participate in the scholarship program must be in good standing with their governing body and the Georgia Driver's Education Commission and agree to general oversight including the enforcement of driver's education standards adopted by the governing body and annual program reviews or audits.
- 7. Providers must agree to auditing and general oversight as required by the Georgia Driver's Education Commission.

- 8. Providers must agree that the scholarship grants may only be applied toward a standard 30/6 driver's education course in which the student receives a minimum of 30 hours of classroom instruction and 6 hours of behind the wheel instruction. For the purpose of this scholarship criteria, classroom instruction means in-person training conducted by an approved instructor. Virtual classroom instruction does not qualify for eligibility in this grant scholarship program.
- 9. The provider must agree that the reimbursement to the provider by the Commission based upon a scholarship grant to a student applicant for the 30/6 course will not exceed \$500.00. Further, the provider must agree that it will not impose any additional fee to the student for the 30/6 course. The Commission agrees that contracts will not be amended to accommodate fee increases.
- 10. The provider must agree that request for reimbursement of the scholarship grant submitted to the Georgia Driver's Education Commission will be the same cost or less than that cost charged to the general public for driver's education for a 30/6 driver's education course.
- 11. The provider must agree to submit an OCRA Certificate to the Commission within 30 days after completion of the course by the student grantee as proof that the course was completed. The provider must further agree that reimbursement to the provider by the Commission for any scholarship grant will be made after proof has been provided to the Commission after completion of the course. In the event that the student fails the driver's education course, the provider must submit a copy of the Student Log detailing the student's attendance in the course and a statement detailing the reason for failure in order for payment to be made to the provider. In the event that the student grantee withdraws from the course or fails to timely complete the driver's education course, the provider may charge the Georgia Driver's Education Commission up to \$4.00 per hour of classroom education completed and up to \$62.50 per hour of behind the wheel training completed. Providers must submit student logs detailing classroom hours and behind the wheel training completed in order to be compensated for students who have withdrawn from the course or have failed to timely complete the driver's education course. The total amount reimbursed for a student who withdraws or fails will not exceed \$491.00.
- 12. The provider may not set in place additional eligibility requirements for the students in addition to those set forth by the Georgia Driver's Education Commission.

i Paragraph A-4 amended to increase the maximum income level for second priority of scholarship awards for financial need to 125% of the free and reduced priced meals for students in the State of Georgia. Paragraph A-4 and A-5 amended to provide that grant scholarship allocations in priority level one and priority level two will be evenly distributed among Georgia's Untied States congressional districts. Paragraph A-7 amended to delete the provision allowing students reapply for the scholarship up to six times and including that students are only eligible to apply for a grant scholarship one time. Paragraph B-7 amended to delete the provision permitting the provider to charge the

grant scholarship student and co-grant awardee parent up to half of the price of the driver's education course for students who withdraws or fails to timely complete the course and includes the provision for providers to charge hourly rates to the Commission for students who withdraw from the course or fail to timely complete the course. ii Paragraph A-1 was amended to include a driver's license in addition to a learner's permit for student eligibility criteria. Paragraph A-9 was amended to delete the provision that the provider may charge the student applicant and co applicant for up to half of the price of the driver's education course. Georgia Traffic Deaths - Yearly Total and Comparison GDOT Office of Traffic Operations Fatalities as of 09/23/2022




